### **SUMMARY**

#### **SOJOURN HIGHLIGHTS**

Day 1: Devoted paddlers arrived despite bad weather forecasts to set up camping sites and prepare for the float. There were a few rain showers while registration and set up commenced. There were 3 waves of paddlers that filled 7 miles of the waterway for 5 hours. The first group Put In as a major rain shower began but fortunately it only lasted for 20 minutes then was followed by partly cloudy skies. Upon taking out, paddlers experienced an environmental celebration featuring speakers from Bartramian Audubon Society, Jennings Environmental Center, and Allegheny Aquatic Alliance while their delicious dinner was being prepared. Attendees learned about native plant, animal, and bird species to look for on the 2<sup>nd</sup> day paddle, local and global water threats, and actions to take. They experienced firsthand the reasons why these actions are important and necessary. As the evening continued, attendees participated in raffle drawings and silent auctions and were mesmerized by musicians and fire dancers as they roasted marshmallows by the bon fire.

Day 2: Paddlers awoke to a wet morning as it had rained throughout the night but as the sun broke through the clouds, it transformed into a gorgeous day. After feeling refreshed from a delicious breakfast, attendees prepared for their second day of floating. More attendees arrived and paddlers began putting in. Everyone enjoyed a beautiful, leisurely float as they witnessed bald eagles and blue herons flying above them. Paddlers even had the opportunity to see some of the plant and animal species they learned about the day before. As the float came to an end, happy attendees were shuttled back to their vehicles, where they collected their camping gear and reflected on the successful event.
